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FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Well, after Alice's extensive and deep dive into *Variables that Affect Swatches*, I have had to do some re-thinking. On our website in the Member Only section and under Tutorials are the following:

These are primarily worksheets to use to make notes along with the recommended sizes by machine. Refer to your manual for specifics and remember all the tips that Alice mentioned – one side of your machine may knit looser or tighter than the other side and Alice gave compensation recommendations for these variables. Measuring within marked margins is imperative as well. Although I did do some hand knitting prior to my machine knitting, the 4" x 4" swatch that seems prevalent in hand knitting seems minute compared to 100 stitches x 100 rows! The large swatches, and measuring 40 stitches x 60 rows, as I remember comes from the use of Knitleaders / Knit Radars. The large swatch also can be held up to your body to get an idea of size for finished garment as well as a better idea of drape.

CONGRATULATIONS to the members who entered the MN State Fair. The September meeting shall be fun to see what was entered and to hear the score card comments.

In Minnesota we are still immersed in 80° days, so it is hard to think about brisk and cold days ahead, but it is time to begin thinking about new winter knitting.

Timidity Doily

Machine: any bulky gauge machine
 This pattern can be adapted for a Mid-Gauge machine by raising the Tension 2 whole numbers.

Yarn: 1 strand Timidity by HiKoo, doily requires approx. 2 ounces of yarn. \$8.95/skein
 1 skein will make this doily. Order this yarn from our shop. We will wind the skein onto a cone for a \$1 fee.

Suggested Tension: 6

Upper Yarn Mast Tension: loose

Skill Level: intermediate

Needle set-up: with scrap yarn E-wrap cast on needles L15 -0- R15.
 RC000 Tension 6, knit 10 rows of scrap yarn ending with carriage on the right. Knit 1 row of ravel cord. Change to main yarn. Knit 1 row. Set carriage to hold.
 Place 6 needles on the far left. Knit 4 rows. *Adjust weights so stitches don't come off the needles.*
 Carriage on right, place another 6 needles in hold. Knit 4 rows. Continue this short rowing method until 6 stitches remain in work. Knit 2 rows over all needles, ending with carriage on the right. *The first section is complete.*
 Make 13 more sections for a complete circle, but on last section knit 2 rows instead of 4. Hang hem to bind off, or scrap off and graft seam.
 Attach fringe. Steam hard to lay flat, especially the center.

Fringe: Starting at one end of the doily, with wrong side facing, pick up two loops and hang on needles. Using fringe yarn, E-wrap over these same two needles, skip 6 empty needles, and E-wrap two more needles. *The empty needles create the fringe.*
 Carriage on the right, thread carriage with fringe yarn. Tension 6, knit 2 rows. Hang two more loops from doily and hang on the same original needles. Knit 2 rows. Continue in this manner all the way around the knit piece.
 To finish: ravel down and cut loops. Tying is not necessary unless an unusual amount of rough handling is expected.
