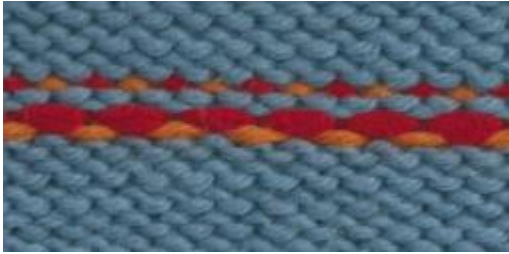


## Double Marker Row

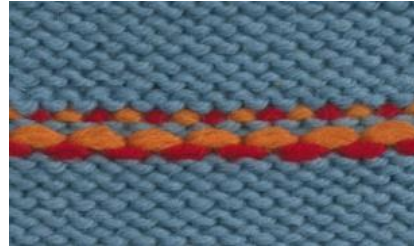
Use this for stockinette hems or for any double band.

This technique requires two passes of the carriage, resulting in 1 row knit on alternate needles.

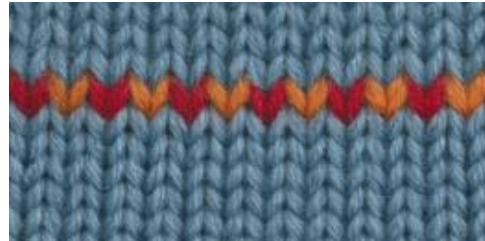
The photos use two colors of yarn to better show the technique. With both versions the gold yarn was knit with the first pass and the red yarn the second pass of the carriage.



**Method I**

From the stockinette side you can see one row has been knit with two passes of the carriage.

### **Method I:**

Pass 1: Put every other needle to hold position. Engage part / slip on carriage. Knit 1 row.  
The needles in hold position knit, those in work position did not.

Pass 2: Put the opposite every other needle to hold (the ones that were not in hold on the previous pass of the carriage). Keep carriage in part /slip. Knit 1 row.  
The needles in hold position knit, those work position did not knit.

### **Method II:**

Pass 1: Put every other needle to hold position. Engage hold on carriage. Knit 1 row.  
The needles in work position knit, those in hold position did not.

Pass 2: Remove the carriage from hold and set to part or slip. Knit 1 row.  
The needles in hold position knit, those work position did not knit.

With both samples the gold yarn was knit first and the red was knit on the second pass. Both methods result in a larger loop to pick up to hang a hem. The first method involves a bit more manipulation of the needles, but may be the more common description of a double marker row.
